Design Technology

It has been brilliant to see so many classes working on DT projects. Recently, children in Owls class finished their pop-up books (mechanisms) and these are now on display in school. During lessons, children learnt the importance of accurate measuring, precise cutting and appropriate design features for the intended audience (Year 1). In Kingfisher class, the children have been designing their very own 'sling-shot' vehicles. The skills they have developed include: making a wooden chassis with the aid of a hot-glue gun, accurate measuring to make axles with wheels and creating a design for the vehicle body, The children reviewed their models, making adjustments as they discovered that their vehicles only travelled in a straight line if their wheels and axles were aligned.
